Broken Halo: The Fall Of Nigerian Pastors

Psalms 105:15 - "Touch not my anointed, do my prophet no harm" is now the most popular Bible verse in Nigeria as Men of God struggle to hide the many failings of their human flesh.



Previously, these canal failings of the Men of God would have slipped by unchallenged, but Nigerians have become more 'awake' as they grapple with the current economic and societal difficulties facing the country. Today, questions are being asked about the relationship between a pastor's lifestyle, church funds and other church assets [e.g.: universities, private jets]. Life's difficulties have created a congregation of doubting Thomas; Psalms 105:15 is fast losing its potency. The doubt is not in their faith in God, but in the 'anointed' modern day prophets and the church structure.

Every new week is now greeted with a new scandal centred on a Man of God. The revelations about the inside workings of the church and its leaders will only increase, as we are in the information dissemination age. Information can now be recorded and distributed around the world in less than a second.

Some of the recent difficulties

Despite the easy flow of information and the awareness of Nigerians, there are still some major challenges in unravelling the lifestyle of Nigerian Pastors.

Apart from a high regard for Psalms 105:15, a lot of congregants are afraid of divine misfortune after speaking up. A few others do not want to be labelled as those behind the fall of the church/Man of God.

Pastor Chris Oyakhilome of Believers Loveworld Inc. [Christ Embassy], during his divorce saga, warned his congregation to refrain from speaking against a man of God.

“To speak against the man of God is to bring a curse on yourself and your children. When you hear people speaking against a man of God, move away from there. Men of God don’t just talk. When they speak, God is forced to move,” he said during a church service.

These fears are heavily fed and nurtured by some readings in the Holy bible. E.g.: When Miriam and Aaron spoke against Moses, Miriam was plagued with leprosy. Numbers 12:9-10 [The anger of the Lord burned against them, and he left them. When the cloud lifted from above the tent, Miriam’s skin was leprous[a]—it became as white as snow. Aaron turned toward her and saw that she had a defiling skin disease.]

Reasons why questions are being asked

If the church must become more responsible to God, society and its followers, then questions must be asked.

God encourages believers to ask questions. 1 John 4:1 - *"Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God. For many false prophets have gone out into the world."*

If Christians do not ask questions, church leaders will sleep on duty, take a piss on the bible and probably go unpunished. Nigerian pastors are gradually becoming lords whose actions cannot be questioned.

The church is presently rife with stories of fraud, sexual immorality and consumerism. Some recent scandals involving men of God include- the alleged loss of \$5 million to a Ponzi scheme by Kingsway International Christian Centre lead by Pastor Mathew Ashimolowo and the explosive sexual scandal involving preacher Apostle Suleman.

When accused of wrong doing, Nigerian Pastors hide under the tagline 'religious prosecution'. Should their congregation not hold them accountable especially when these accusations are backed by evidences? [1 Timothy 5:19-20]

Even in cases when the Pastors promised the congregation a 'robust reply', the reply never comes.

An example is the news that broke out about 4 years ago that Pastor Biodun Fatoyinbo of Common Wealth Of Zion Assembly (COZA) Ministries had been sleeping with a church member. The member had published a detailed account of the affair, which circulated widely, to which the pastor had promised a "robust reply" shortly thereafter. No robust response came forth afterwards, and he not even offered an apology or explanation to his church members.

1 Corinthians 11:28 calls for self-examination; are Nigerian pastors exempted from the call?

What the churches need to do

These cases are reminders that religion provides a perfect platform for unscrupulous men to capitalise on the fear peddled in scriptures to exploit billions of gullible people around the world. Churches need to revisit their doctrines on veneration of men of God. They need to accept that all men are fallible.

The Bible in Song of Solomon 2:15 - *"Catch the foxes for us, The little foxes that are ruining the vineyards, While our vineyards are in blossom."*

Just as it is with public officials and secular leaders, pastors who abuse their positions of trust should be held accountable and purged of their ill behaviour. If not, the church, as it is seen now, will continue to be exploitative and become a den of concealed abuse.

Congregants should also stop being preys and gullible to the actions and inactions of the pastors. They should become more responsible for their lives and know God for themselves.

Nigerian Pastors have certainly fallen from their pedestals, but only God knows those that have fallen from Grace.

Meningitis: 6 Important Things Nigerians Should Know

Three weeks ago, the Federal Government announced the outbreak of a new strain of Cerebro Spinal Meningitis (CSM) in parts of the country. Minister of Health, Prof. Isaac Adewole said that the new strain, which is not common in Nigeria, was imported from Niger Republic. He said all the states in northwest region are prone to the disease and the states would be treated equally when confronted by outbreaks such as this. Over 340 Nigerians have died due to the outbreak since late last year.



In a rather unfortunate move, the governor of Zamfara state, which has been severely hit by the epidemic, alluded the disease to a form of punishment from God because of the increase in sin among Nigerians. His statement raised a backlash from different quarters and he has since retracted his statement.

Here are 6 important things you should know about meningitis:

Origin

Meningitis is a disease caused by the inflammation of the protective membranes covering the brain and spinal cord, known as the meninges. The inflammation is usually activated by an infection of the fluid surrounding the brain and spinal cord.

Types

There are five types of meningitis depending on the cause. Bacterial meningitis, Viral meningitis, Fungal meningitis, Parasitic meningitis and Non-infectious meningitis. The severity of illness and the ensuring type of treatment depend largely on the specific cause. The bacterial version of meningitis is the most deadly, accounting for the deaths of over 100,000 people around the world every year

Causes

The germs that cause bacterial meningitis can be contagious. Some bacteria can spread through the exchange of respiratory and throat secretions like kissing. Fortunately, most of the bacteria that cause bacterial meningitis are not as contagious as diseases like the common cold or the flu. Also, the bacteria are not spread by casual contact or by simply breathing the air where a person with meningitis has been.

Susceptibility

Although infants and children under the age of 5 are known to be at a higher risk, the nature of the disease means it can affect anyone at any time. Geographical locations also do not matter as it affects people of all races. Meningitis may be more frequent in low income areas and where vaccines are not as available, but it is still found in every corner of every society.

Symptoms

Meningitis infection may show up in a person by a sudden onset of fever, headache and stiff neck. Other symptoms like nausea, vomiting, increased sensitivity to light and confusion may also be experienced. Children may appear to be inactive, grumpy or feeding poorly. Later symptoms can be severe live seizures or coma. If you have these symptoms, see your doctor immediately

Vaccination/Treatment/Prevention

The most effective way to protect you and your child against certain types of bacterial meningitis is through vaccination. Other prevention tactics include hand-washing frequently, exercising regularly, maintaining a stable immune system and covering your mouth when you sneeze or cough.



How Linda Ikeji 'Destroyed' My Career

I had a job; one of those jobs where the dress requirement never matches the salary, thank God for night market! My job was good for a beginner; it held great prospects for the career I wanted, but it never got me the recognition I deserved. So, armed with this wonderful self-assessment, I quit my job at a burgeoning career in one of Nigeria's top banks and proceeded to gather all the tools I needed to become the next big thing in Nigeria's blogosphere.

I bought a domain; Linda did not have one at the time. I found a great techie to help me with all the details: server, website, email etc. and a good creative friend helped me with logo and branding. When all was done, before a single word was written, I high-fived myself in every single way possible. My site, logo, branding, domain and ideas were bigger and better than madam Ikeji's.

So now, time for work. I wrote my first post with all the enthusiasm in the world and shared it with my dear friends on social media, my former colleagues and my wide contacts and connections. The response was great; they liked it, shared it and commented on it. The second post went just as well. Then my tech chap, who was monitoring the visitors to the site told me that while people were enthusiastic on social media, there were not actually coming to the site. He then dropped a bombshell and asked, what will you do differently from Linda Ikeji and the other entertainment sites, what special insight do you have? How can you use your contacts to create a unique selling proposition? Oh I wished he had asked me this before I left the cosy left corner in the bank head office.

I was equipped for my last job, almost over-equipped. In addition to my degree, I had multiple certifications that most beginners never bother with. I had prepared well for life after school. While I was in college, I thought an accounting degree would put food on my table – going through the rigorous class lectures and drills. However, little did I know that I would end up not punching the calculator, but weaving words together – as a blogger.

Nigeria's influential blogger, Linda Ikeji, poster child for blogging in Nigeria changed my life. I allowed her to change my life even when I wasn't ready for that change. Her fame, designer clothes and luxurious trips reeled me in. I got in without a solid plan.

Linda Ikeji makes success look easy and is to blame for most of the copycat blogs around Africa. Her astounding achievement as a solo blogger who has gone on to own a thriving media enterprise is an admirable feat.

It's easy to jump into blogging after reading of her success, but many like me are hardly prepared for the real work. I wasn't even very passionate about blogging when I started out; all I wanted to do was write a bit and get that advertising dollars. I didn't even have a strategy or a fall back plan. It was all supposed to be easy.

The life of a career blogger is anything but easy. Very few people listen when Linda Ikeji says she hardly socialises as she has to stay at home to work on her blog. Our eyes are too fixated on the designer shoes and bags she constantly flaunts on Instagram.

We also forget that she officially started blogging in 2007, almost four years before she made a dime from it. Linda Ikeji also has almost as much enemies and friends- still not sure I'm ready for that life. She is renowned for controversies, mostly due to her gossip style of writing, which many have criticised for lacking in credibility. In 2014, her blog came under scrutiny amidst allegations of plagiarism and unfair usage of images, which led to the blogging platform Blogger, run by Google, temporarily taking her website offline. She remained unshaken.

At 36, Linda Ikeji is expanding beyond blogging to build a media empire. While she continues to serve as a source of inspiration, it is important to look beyond the glitz. Just like Rome, the Linda Ikeji Empire wasn't built in one day. The fancy things are paid for by years of endless grinding. Overnight success is a myth.

4. Help on a rainy day: There are times when you may run short on cash and need a bridge to take you through till your salary arrives

5. In the case of a contract worker, you need to be contracted to an approved company and must have valid contract terms.

2. Between 250,000 to 370,000 – 2.25% per month
3. Between 375,000 to 1,500,000 – 2.08% interest

Documents to present:

1. Confirmation letter
2. Letter from employer
3. Salary domiciliary letter
